# Dr. Banbury's Welcome to the 2010-2011 School Year

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Dear Parents,
The school year is now well underway, and, by the time you read this first newsletter of 2010-2011, we will have already sent home interim grades for first quarter! The opening of the school year was exceptionally smooth, and I am happy to report that Oakton once again made our Annual Yearly Progress (AYP). This rigorous benchmark of No Child Left Behind legislation becomes more and more difficult to achieve, but, each year, Oakton students and teachers rise to the occasion. Both our Standards of Learning (SOL) and our Advanced Placement (AP) scores were exceptional and

demonstrated the hard work our faculty and students continue to put forth in their classes every day. This year marks the fourth year of

Collaboration Wednesdays, and our curriculum teams continue to plan instruction, align curriculum, develop common assessments, create departmental grading, and focus on instruction. The results have been overwhelmingly positive as evidenced by the increase in all our scores.

In 2010-2011, we will continue in our efforts to further improve in all academic areas with a new initiative and focus called Cougar Time, a support period within the school day that extends academic learning time for all students. The creation of Cougar Time required only slight changes in the bell schedule, but those slight changes give our students the opportunity to receive extra assistance, intervention and enrichment during the school day. Except for Collaboration Wednesdays, Cougar Time occurs daily between first and second block. During Cougar Time, all students are expected to be engaged in academic activities.

By 2013, our goal at Oakton High School is that all our students will have completed at least one Honors or AP class before graduation. Our belief is that students who challenge themselves with Honors or AP will be better prepared for college or any other post secondary pursuit. Our AP program continues to flourish and grow, and I am delighted to let you know that we recently received the following information from the College Board about this year's AP Scholars from Oakton High School:

- AP Scholars (3 or higher on 3 or more AP Exams) 164 students
- Scholar with Honor (3.25 average and 3 or higher on 4 or more

2013, our goal at Oakton High AP Exams) - 75 students

- Scholar with Distinction (3.5 average and 3 or higher on 5 or more AP Exams) - 125 students
- National Scholar (4 average and 4 or higher on 8 or more AP Exams) 17 students

That is a total of 364 students from 11th and 12th grades (last year) that earned these honors!

In closing, I would like to congratulate our students on their outstanding performance and exceptional results from last year and thank you for your commitment to making Oakton High School exceed in an environment that focuses on high standards of student learning for all our students. A cluster and school wide goal for Oakton this year is that our students can achieve a 100 percent pass rate on all their spring SOL tests. With your help, we believe that we can achieve this goal. As 2010-2011 unfolds, please continue to encourage your sons and daughters to aim high and challenge themselves when they are setting their academic goals for this year and their remaining years in high school. ## YOUR CHILD'S SECURITY: The New Problem of "Sexting"

Sexting" refers to sending a text message with pictures of children or teens that are inappropriate, naked or engaged in sex acts. According to a recent survey, about 20 percent of teen boys and girls have sent such messages. The emotional pain it causes can be enormous for the child in the picture as well as the sender and receiver-often with legal implications. Parents must

begin the difficult conversation about sexting before there is a problem and introduce the issue as soon as a child is old enough to have a cell phone.

Here are some tips for how to begin these conversations with your children:

- Talk to your kids, even if the issue hasn't directly impacted your community. "Have you heard of sexting?" "Tell me what you think it is." For the initial part of the conversation, it is important to first learn what your child's understanding is of the issue and then add to it an age appropriate explanation (see next bullet).
- Use examples appropriate for your child's age. For younger children with cell phones who do not yet know about sex, alert them that text messages should never contain pictures of people-kids or adults-without their clothes on, kissing or touching each other in ways that they've never seen before. For older children, use the term "sexting" and give more specifics about sex acts they may

know about. For teens, be very specific that "sexting" often involves pictures of a sexual nature and is considered pornography.

- Make sure kids of all ages understand that sexting is serious and considered a crime in many jurisdictions. In all communities, if they "sext", there will be serious consequences, quite possibly involving the police, suspension from school, and notes on the sexter's permanent record that could hurt their chances of getting into college or getting a job.
  - Experts have noted that peer pressure can play a

major role in the sending of texts, with parties being a major contributing factor. Collecting cell phones at gatherings of tweens and teens is one way to reduce this temptation.

 Monitor headlines and the news for stories about "sexting" that illustrate

the very real consequences for both senders and receivers of these images. "Have you seen this story?" "What did you think about it?" "What would you do if you were this child?" Rehearse ways they can respond if asked to participate in inappropriate texting.

- Encourage school and town assemblies to educate parents, teachers and students.
- Watch the ABC Good Morning America segment from 4/15/09 featuring a town hall meeting with teens that have sent and received "sexts," parents and experts.

## Virginia Tech Study Reflects the Dangers of Distracted Driving

Virginia Tech study showed that of crash and near-crash occurrences, 80% of all crashes, and 65% of all near-crashes involved a distracted driving incident within 3 seconds of the event.

How many of these things do you do while driving? Every time you get behind the wheel while distracted, your chances of a crash increase. Don't take any more chances:

\*TEXTING: 23 TIMES INCREASE IN CRASH RISK

\*REACHING FOR A MOVING OBJECT:
9 TIMES INCREASE IN CRASH RISK
\*DRIVING DROWSY: 5 TIMES INCREASE IN CRASH RISK

\*USING A CELL PHONE: 4 TIMES INCREASE IN CRASH RISK

\*LOOKING AT AN EXTERNAL OBJECT: 4 TIMES INCREASE IN CRASH RISK \*READING: 4 TIMES INCREASE IN CRASH RISK

\*DIALING A PHONE: 3 TIMES IN-CREASE IN CRASH RISK

\*APPLYING MAKEUP: 3 TIMES IN-CREASE IN CRASH RISK Since cell phone use occurs more frequently and for longer duration, this is the #1 source of driver inattention behind the wheel.

DON'T DRIVE DISTRACTED.

Think about all the things you do behind the wheel besides driving...now think about how many times you've had a close call. Half a million people were injured each year and another 6,000 were killed by drivers who were distracted, particularly by their phones (U.S. Department of Transportation). Some studies have even shown that texting while driving is just as dangerous as driving drunk (Car and Driver Magazine).

Operating a multi-ton vehicle requires full attention. Put the phone away, minimize your distractions and don't use your drive time as your down time.
