ear Oakton Parents,

Despite the weather, we are in the middle of winter and at the dawn of the third quarter. This is a great time to review how your children are feeling about their classes and if there are any adjustments that can be made as they go into the second half of the year. Planners are still available—and now are free (!), so if you believe planners would help your children or if theirs have been misplaced, please inquire in the office. The high school has many other resources available, so if you need help and are not sure where to turn, check in with your children's teachers or counselor.

The review of how your children are feeling about the year will be beneficial as they consider which classes to take in the coming years. As you well know, it is not a simple task to balance their academic requirements, their academic desires, their elective passions and their outside activities. For each of my children the path has been different. It has been especially useful for us when sitting down with them to include planning several years out as much as possible. The new honors choices, while providing more options in English and social studies also make course selection more complicated, especially given that the vote for these courses took place on January 26 and so the curriculum has yet to be developed. Please be patient with this process. Oakton's teachers are among the finest in the country and they have a complicated task before them. There is a retreat occurring at the county level where the curriculum is being defined, then it will come into the schools where our teachers will take that input and turn it into what it looks like when it is taught to our children. Our teachers are familiar with our population and with how our courses flow from year to year. These classes will need to be integrated into our existing offerings such that they make sense in the context of our children's high school education. The teachers and administration have chosen to offer these classes in the way that they feel will allow the most options while hopefully preserving the widest range of electives possible. Your understanding and support as everyone

adjusts to these new options will help to make the transition as easy as possible.

Keep an eye out in the school hallways. The new Oakton Honor initiative will soon include the addition of fabulous visuals throughout the building to remind our children of the importance of honor. Letter from the Principal: New Classes Next Year

ear Parents,

I hope that you enjoyed a peaceful and warm holiday season. With second semester already underway, the Oakton High School community has much to anticipate in this new year: course registration for 2012-2013 will occur during February and March; our very first Exhibition of Learning will unveil on March 20 and 21; AP and SOL Exams are just around the bend; and before we know it, the summer will be upon us.

Recently, the FCPS School Board approved the addition of five new courses to our curriculum: English 11 Honors, English 12 Honors, World History 2 Honors, US/VA History Honors, and US Government Honors. Since Oakton High School has historically prioritized options for interdisciplinary learning through course offerings that combine the study of history and English, the inclusion of new honors courses requires us to reconsider the configuration of our humanities options. Administrators, department chairs, and teachers engaged in many discussions and meetings to devise course offerings that best meet the needs of our community and the constraints of our master schedule. Below are the English and social studies offerings for the coming school year.

The new honors courses will add depth and complexity to the Program of Studies of the regular curriculum at each grade level. Over the next several months, teachers and county specialists will be working to define the curricula for these courses more specifically. We are particularly excited about the opportunities that these new courses will provide for interdisciplinary studies in grades ten through twelve.

As you consider the best coursework for your child, I invite you to challenge your child with at least one Advanced Placement course before graduation in expectation of the rigors of college. Oakton High School offers 22 AP courses, so I have no doubt that one will interest your child. If you have any questions about our course offerings, please feel free to consult your child's school counselor.

Once again, I would like to invite you, your family, and your friends to attend our inaugural Exhibition of Learning on March 20 and 21 at Oakton High School from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. All Oakton students will have the opportunity to present meaningful learning experiences of their choice to our community at this open house. I hope you will set a couple of hours aside to see the variety and quality of our students' many accomplishments. The Exhibition of Learning affords us an opportunity to rally as a community behind the significance of learning beyond report cards and test scores. See you there!

he counselors have continued to focus on the needs of the students both individually and by grades. In our next installment of the Freshman Transition Program, counselors met with the 9th graders to review time management strategies. The lessons also included the importance of becoming involved in the school through sports, clubs and other activities. Registration becomes a major undertaking as we first visited class rooms to familiarize students with the courses available for the upcoming year. For this year, the department has developed an extended schedule to increase one-on-one time with each student, while reducing the time missed from instruction. Counselors will meet with each student to discuss their progress and develop a four year plan. We will start with rising 10th graders Feb. 13 -24, Rising 11th Feb. 28th – March 9th and rising 12th March 12th through the 23rd. Visits to middle schools are also part of the process. Please be aware that this may impact counselor's turnaround time for emails and phone calls.

A note to parents of Juniors - We have not forgotten the college application process. As spring approaches, SAT/ ACT season is upon us and information can be found at sat.collegeboard.com, and www.actstudent.org. The department will be holding junior programs for parents and students later in the year to begin the college search, touching on web resources, college visits, etc. Making certain your student is registered for this testing (and doing well in classes) is the top priority right now. Please look for Keep in Touch emails and future newsletters for more information.

The No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act, requires an annual English language proficiency assessment of all limited English proficient (LEP) students who are either receiving or not receiving English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) services. To meet this federal requirement, the WIDA ACCESS for ELLs® test will be given at Oakton during the month of February. Letters with details and dates have been mailed (and students received a copy) if testing is required. Please make every effort to have your child in attendance on the day his or her test is scheduled. If you have any questions feel free to contact Michael D. HELP PREVENT THEFTS FROM VEHICLES

Recently, SRO Darrell Estess has noticed numerous vehicles being parked at Oakton High School with valuables inside in plain view. The following security information is available on the Safety & Security tab on the Oakton High School home page.

Keep valuables out of sight. In fact, keep anything portable out of sight. Cars have been entered for a few CDs left on a seat. An empty car interior is not very appealing to a thief. If you must park with valuables, place them in the trunk and be sure it is properly locked. At the very minimum, locking items in your glove compartment provides some increased security. Always remember to lock your car doors and activate your car's security system.

It is recommended that you record the serial numbers of any electronic devices and

mark your property with an electric engraver. Operation Identification is a nationwide program designed to discourage theft of valuables and provide a way for you to easily identify stolen property.

If you mark all valuables with permanent identification numbers, the thief will find it difficult to sell them to a "fence." It also helps security or the police to contact you when the property is recovered and lets you easily identify it so it can be returned to you.

There will be a MANDATORY spring sports drop-in registration for athletes only on Wed., February 15 in the cafeteria, 2:30-3:30. At this time, coaches will check to make sure all athletes have turned in their paper work and give out last minute instructions before tryouts. Each student needs a doctor's physical dated after May 1, 2011 on file in the Activities Office in order to try out. (If you played a fall or winter sport, your physical is already on file.) The official VHSL physical form must be used. Each student also needs to give the coach a new Emergency Care Information Form. The emergency care form you turned in at the beginning of the year or to another coach cannot be used. All forms can be found at www.oaktonathletics.org or on the Activities Office door. Call 703-319-2760 for more information. Also, this year every athlete and one parent must view an on-line power point about concussions before tryouts.
