The end of the school year is in sight, and I want to take this opportunity to thank you, as well as our faculty and staff, and our wonderful Oakton High School students for all the effort in making this year another very successful one. By the time you read this final PTSA Newsletter, we will have completed AP and SOL testing and will be headed into final exams. In addition, I want to remind you that there are numerous events taking place in June, so please take a moment to review the Oakton website and plan to attend our many programs, awards ceremonies, and concerts.

I also want to tell you about a new and exciting initiative that will take place June 21- 23. We will use the make-up snow days added by the school board to pilot an exciting new program called "2.Oakton." This new program is intended to give students a head start for the coming school year. We need your support for this opportunity that will contribute to your child's success and to our culture of continuous improvement at Oakton.

Students perceive the end of the school year as the end of the book, a conclusion with little anticipation for a sequel. In reality, the end of the school year is the end of a chapter; the journey continues. As educators, we want to foster this perspective by helping students to prepare for the next phase of their education. The purpose of our end-of-the-year plan is to identify and practice skills that are essential for success early in the coming school year. Sessions will provide hands-on activities and modeling to introduce

or reinforce these necessary skills. Teachers will emphasize the expectations for summer assignments and guide students through practice activities. Students will rotate through schedules geared to nurture all levels of learners including curriculum support in English, science, math, history, world languages, and electives courses.

Students will choose nine different sessions in which to participate over the course of the three days. Each of these sessions will last approximately 70 minutes, and classes will end at 11:15 on each of those days. Since this is a pilot program, students will be surveyed at the end for their feedback on the effectiveness of the program.

We are thrilled to pilot this program for FCPS because we have the opportunity to introduce students to their new classes and prepare them with tools to ensure their own success. The time schedule and seminar offerings will be posted on Oakton's website. Please take a few minutes to familiarize yourself with these opportunities and discuss them with your student. Thank you in advance for your continued support.

Finally, Dianne Goins, the senior class administrator, and I would like to congratulate the class of 2010 and let them know how very proud we are of all their accomplishments. They have excelled academically, in the arts, on the courts and fields, and, most importantly, they have become outstanding young adults who have an opportunity to make a difference in the world. # Medicine pick-up must be completed by June 24

**T**he school clinic is reminding parents and guardians that all medication stored in the clinic must be picked up no later than the student dismissal time on the last day of school. Medication left in the clinic after that time will be discarded. It is school policy that medications must be picked up by the parent or guardian. Medication cannot be sent home with your student. However, with parent or guardian permission, a high school student may transport over-the-counter medications to and from the school clinic.

Medication authorization forms for next school year may be obtained from the school or online at [www.fcps.edu/forms.htm](http://www.fcps.edu/forms.htm). A medication authorization form is required for any medication, prescription or over-the-counter, to be kept at school. Please be sure medication orders are clear. All information on the form must be completed. Part I must be signed and dated by the parent or guardian. Part II must be signed and dated by your physician. Over-the-counter medication given for headache, muscle pain, orthodontic pain, or menstrual cramps and antibiotic

or anti-viral medication do not need a physician signature. More detailed information is available on the back of the medication authorization form.

Over-the-counter medication must be in the original container and clearly labeled by the parent or guardian. All prescription medication, including physician's samples, must be labeled by the pharmacist or physician. Please make sure that the label clearly states your student's name, the name of the medication, the dosage of the medication, and the time interval for administration.

If your child will be enrolled in a summer program sponsored by Fairfax County Public Schools, your existing long-term medication authorization form(s) may be used for the summer program. Please let the clinic know if you would like a copy of the form(s).

Your cooperation will ensure that we can safely give your student his or her medication. If you have any questions, please contact your clinic room aide, Denise Lutz, at 703-319-2734, or your school public health nurse, Tracey Paterno-Hardy, RN, BSN, at 703-319-2711.

### Virginia Private College Week: July 26-31

Virginia private colleges offer students a friendly, academic community where teaching comes first and students receive personal attention and mentoring. In addition to visiting excellent private colleges in the state, you could SAVE money by participating in Virginia Private College Week! If you visit at least three of the participating colleges (24 in total) during the week, you will receive three application fee waivers. That means NO APPLICATION FEE for three Virginia private colleges of your choice (approximate value is \$100). You do not need to register, but it is strongly recommended that you contact the schools you plan to visit. You should pick up a passport at the first college you visit after completing the tour and have each college stamp your passport after you have completed your visits. ### College of William and Mary Summer Interviews – June 21-August 13

This summer, William and Mary is offering optional on-campus interviews for interested students. While the campuses won't be as busy as during the regular school calendar, you can still get a good "feel" for what a college is like and whether it would be a good fit for you. Plan on attending the information session and taking the campus tour. You should also take the opportunity to talk with students to get their side of the story.

Use your free time to simply read and write. Researchers say that the best way to prepare for college admission tests is to improve your vocabulary, reading comprehension, and writing skills. Keep a journal, write those long overdue letters, and read, read, read.

## Fall sports tryouts, sports physicals on schedule

Tryouts for the fall season are scheduled to start Tuesday, Aug. 10 (Tuesday, Aug. 3 for golf). Fall sports include football, field hockey, girls volleyball, golf, cheerleading, and cross country. Dance team tryouts were in May. All athletes must be there for the tryouts. Please plan your family vacations accordingly. All athletes must have a physical to participate in sports next year. The physical is good for the entire school year for all three seasons of sports, but must be done after May 1, 2010 to be valid. Physicals must be on the official VHSL form (available in the Activities Office, at [www.vhsl.org](http://www.vhsl.org), or [www.oaktonathletics.org](http://www.oaktonathletics.org)). Physicals should be mailed to the Activities Office by July 30 for participation in fall sports. DO NOT GIVE THEM TO

THE COACHES. Fall athletes will also need an Emergency Care Information form (available at [oaktonathletics.org](http://oaktonathletics.org)) that will be turned into the coach – please write the sport on the upper, right-hand corner if you are sending it in with the physical. Athletes will not be able to try out without these two forms. Make a copy of the physical for your records before mailing it in. If you have questions, call the Activities Office at 703-319-2760.

There will be a mandatory fall sports tryouts walk-in registration on August 6 from 5-6 p.m. in the cafeteria. At that time, fall coaches will confirm that all the correct paperwork has been turned in and will give out last-minute instructions about tryouts.

# GRADUATION 2010

**June 17, 2010 - 9:30 a.m.**  
**Patriot Center**  
**George Mason University**

**STUDENT ARRIVAL TIME** - Seniors are expected to arrive at the Patriot Center one (1) hour early (at 8:30 a.m.) – appropriately dressed and carrying their caps and gowns.

**DRESS** – Women should wear dresses or skirts and dress shoes (no sandals). Men should wear white dress shirts, ties, dark dress trousers, dark socks, and dark shoes. No sunglasses, sandals, athletic footwear or sneakers are to be worn. **NO ONE** is to wear jeans. Do not decorate or put signs on your caps or gowns. Use common sense and defer the party attire and party attitude for the All Night Graduation Celebration.

**DO NOT BRING PURSES, CAMERAS, OR ANY VALUABLE ITEMS WITH YOU.** Secured storage will not be provided. You may keep one key on your person during the graduation ceremony.

**BEHAVIOR** – Appropriate behavior is expected by all participants and guests before, during, and after the ceremony. Inappropriate behavior or possession of any inappropriate items by participants or guests may result in the individual(s) being removed from the ceremony and the Patriot Center.

**SECURITY** – Members of the Patriot Center security staff will be stationed throughout the Patriot Center. An orange security tag will be used for identification. Graduation assistants will be stationed at the portals to provide general assistance when needed. They, too, will be wearing tags.

**TICKETS** – Each student will receive 10 tickets for graduation at graduation rehearsal. All persons entering the Patriot Center, excluding graduates, must have a ticket. Students should see Mr. Comstock if more tickets will be needed.

**SEATING** – It is suggested that your family and guests arrive together and early to make your seating selection. The doors will open for parents at 8:30 a.m. All seating is general admission except for seats reserved for the All Night Graduation Fundraiser – Patriot Package.

**SPECIAL NEEDS ACCESSIBILITY** – Parking for guests with disabilities is located at the South and West entrances. Van accessible parking spaces are located adjacent to the South entrance. These spaces are well-marked with the universal hand-capped symbol and are monitored by our staff. Please remember that all vehicles must display state-issued accessible parking tags or placards to park in these spaces. Curb cuts are adjacent to the accessible parking areas. Additionally, the West entrance has a drop-off location close to the entrance doors. All public entrances are at the street/concourse level. Guests with disabilities will find that there are no steps or ramps to maneuver in order to enter the arena. All entrance doors are monitored by our staff.

An elevator is normally available for use in assisting guests with disabilities to access the arena floor. Elevator availability can be limited, however, depending upon the type and nature of a given event.

Deaf and hard-of-hearing people should set themselves in the reserved seating area to the right of the stage when facing the podium.

Wheelchair areas are available with one folding chair for one member of each family who wishes to sit in this area. (Since there is limited space for wheelchairs, please sit either in front of the wheelchair or behind it.) The Patriot Center has a wheelchair that can be used to assist patrons to and from one location to another, but must be returned after each use rather than kept for the duration of the event, so that it is available for others' use.

Handicapped seating is available in rows F and G. These rows are on the concourse level and do not require the hand-capped person to climb any stairs.

**CAMERA POLICY** – Use of hand-held cameras and video cameras is allowed. However, attendees may only film from their seats. Standing in aisles or portals is prohibited. Use of electrical cords or tripods with video cameras is also prohibited.

**BALLOONS AND NOISE MAKERS** – The Patriot Center does not allow helium balloons or air horns.

**FLOWERS FOR YOUR GRADUATE** – The Patriot Center will have a vendor selling flowers to attendees.

## **VIDEO OF GRADUATION** –

The graduation ceremony will be video taped and may be purchased directly from Memories – A Professional Videography Company. Memories, 3966 Springfield Road, Glen Allen, Va 23060, 804-273-9044. Order forms available at graduation.

**PROGRAM NOTE** – The Graduation Program will list the names of the Honor Graduates based on the seventh semester grade point average (4.0 or higher). However, all Honor Graduates (including those who have received a GPA of 4.0 or above by the end of the eighth semester) will be recognized at the graduation ceremony.

Also, the Graduation Program will highlight students identified as potential AP Scholars, a designation determined by the College Board. These are students who may have completed 3 or more AP courses and scored an average of 3 or higher on all AP Exams.

**PHOTOS** – Blanton Studios will take pictures of every senior who crosses the stage. After graduation, they will send home a proof and order form. Questions should be directed to Blanton Studios at 1-800-399-8044.
